But we are dead wrong in thinking we can convert people to Christ with anything other than the Bible message. It will convict the world respecting

You may keep the money, the rich and famous, and silk-stocking row; but you will lose the backbone and fiber that is necessary for a church to prevail and please the Lord. They we will realize the ugly horror of our sins. Then we will see that following Christ is not the decorating of ourselves with pretty shinning gold crosses. Then we will understand what it means to say that our glory is in the cross. Then we will understand the song about the old *rugged* cross.
